AMERICAN FAMILIES NEEDED TO BEFRIEND JEWS FROM THE FORMER SOVIET UNION

Over the past two years, many Minyan families have had the pleasure of befriending refugee families from the former Soviet Union through the community's Family-to-Family program. All who participated have felt that they have learned a great deal from the experience. While for some, it has turned into life-long friendships as the families continue to share life cycle events, Shabbats and Jewish holidays. For emigre families, it has been a highlight of their resettlement in Los Angeles and has enabled them to learn first hand about American and Jewish society and culture.

The federal fiscal year, which ends on September 30, 1992, will have brought to Los Angeles the largest number of Jewish refugees since the beginning of the Soviet Jewry movement (approximately 2,600). Because the refugees place an extremely high value on meeting American families, a long waiting list has developed for the Familyto-family program. The program which is coordinated by Jewish Family Service and the Bureau of Jewish Education has already matched over 400 families but over 200 families are currently waiting to be matched.

If you have not yet, befriended a refugee, please consider participating in this "mitzvah". If you participated in the past, I would like to encourage you to reach out to another family. Singles, couples, families, havurot are all needed.

Participants are asked to complete the enclosed questionnaire and return it to Jewish Family Service, 6380 Wilshire Blvd., Suite 1200, L.A. 90048. You will then be matched based on ages of adults or children, hobbies and/or professions. Newcomers are only matched if there is someone in the family who speaks sufficient English to carry on a conversation.

The commitment is minimal, all that is required is that you get together with the person or family with whom you are matched four times during a six month period and that you periodically phone them to see how they are doing and answer questions which they might have.

Of course we hope that these will also develop into life-long friendships. Minimally, it will give these new Americans an opportunity to become acquainted with families or individuals that are Jewishly committed.

Pairing American & Soviet Jewish Families & Singles

More than 2,500 Soviet Jews are expected in Los Angeles in 1992. Many of them come here with no knowledge of English and, certainly, no inkling as to how we live and work on a day-to-day basis. Plus, thanks to years of religious suppression in Russia, most of the Jews arriving here don't even know the basics of Jewish traditions or Hebrew. We have opened up our country to these fellow Jews; now we need to open up our heritage as well. What can we do?

The Family to Family Project is a joint project of the Bureau of Jewish Education and Jewish Family Service of the Jewish Federation Council of Greater Los Angeles. Volunteer host Americans are paired up with new Soviet immigrants based on information submitted by both. Hosts then invite their Soviet partners to Shabbat and holiday dinners (at least 4 over a sixmonth period). They try to be available to answer their questions on the complexities of living in Los Angeles, to calm their fears and often find that their own family's lives are greatly enriched by this act of reaching out and caring.

So far over 400 families and singles have been matched up with American hosts, but, as you can see from the statistics above, many more are sorely needed.
