## AFTER THE QUAKE

Being shaken out of my bed at 4:30 in the morning is hardly the bonding experience I'd have expected as an L.A. resident. Once I realized this wasn't going to be another quick joli, then back to slecp with a sigh of relief, that's when the real terror set in. Now that the worst is over, I discover the quake has become just that, a leveling influence that's turned us all, rich and poor, renters and homeowners, immigrants and natives both inward and outward in our search for resources to cope in times of stress. Having moved to my new house little more than a year ago, I had yet to meet most of my neighbors. The earthquake took care of that--a belated but welcome silver lining.

Much more than my house and furniture has been shaken, and more than my mirrors, glass dishes and chimney are cracked and shattered.

A profound process of reevaluation began with that rude awakening. The constant aftershocks serve to continue the process, lest I become complacent again.

We all know, somewhere in the back of our minds, that earthquakes are a part of life in L.A. But having lived through many large and small temblors during my thirty-odd years living here, I have to admit. to being a bit jadeu and overcontident. Though I own a well-stocked earthquake kit, unlike some of my neighbors and friends, I found myself questioning whether it would have been enough, if this had been the "Big One". And for the first time in my life, I wondered if I wanted to stick around and find out.

I was somehow immensely comforted by the recent decision to upgrade this quake's intensity, from 6.6 to 6.8, according to the earthquake center in Colorado. All I could think when I heard the original assessment was, "If that's a 6.6, I don't want to be around for an 8.0." Perhaps, like the temblors we had a few weeks before this quake, we will use the experience to prepare in earnest for the "Big One", which will

Did you ever wonder what happens to all the notes deposited in the crevices of the Western Wall?

More than two million people a year go to the Wall, to look, to pray, to be inspired. And because the Wall is such a holy place, most of the people tuck a little note, usually with a special request of Gd, into one of the Wall's crevices. The notes ask for all kinds of things, for children, for peace, for a good grade, for the winning lottery number, on and on.

Every day more and more of them are put in, in all different languages, and yet, there is always room for more. How is that? Where do all the notes go? An Israeli journalist decided to find out.

There were all kinds of guesses about the fate of all those notes. One woman said they all go up to heaven where the angels sort them out. One man said he assumed they were disintegrated into pulp. Yet another said he thought the sanitation department removes them and takes them to the city dump.

Well, this is what really happens. Rabbi Meir Yehuda Herz, religious caretaker of the Wall, removes them twice a year. The Wall is carefully cleaned out of all scraps that have accumulated just before Pesach and Rosh Hashanah. All the notes are carefully placed in large bags, receiving the same treatment as damaged Torah
scrolls, and during the night twice a year they are carried off to a special cave in the cemetery on the "Mount of Olives" and buried in a dignified ceremony. There they stay, a permanent record reflecting the hopes, fears, dreams, spiritual and day-to-day concerns of this generation of Jews.
